## Town of Brant and Village of Farnham Master Plan (2003)

### 5.5 Historic Resources

The Brant-Farnham community has no properties or districts listed on the National or State Register of Historic Places. However there are four structures, one in Brant and three in Farnham, that are eligible for inclusion on the National Register for Historic Places according to the Erie County Department of Environment and Planning. They are:

- Sprague-Albrich-Shoultz Farmhouse, a Greek Revival structure on the south side of NY 249/Commercial Street 100 feet east of US 20
- L.H. Schwartz Building, built in 1902, housed the first Village Hall on the upper floor, is located on the corner of Commercial Street and Railroad Avenue
- Lewis-Flouring-Bedka House at 489 Commercial Street, built circa 1870

The 2003 Town of Brant and Village of Farnham Master Plan (Page 105) which lists structures in the Town of Brant and Village of Farnham with historical significance.

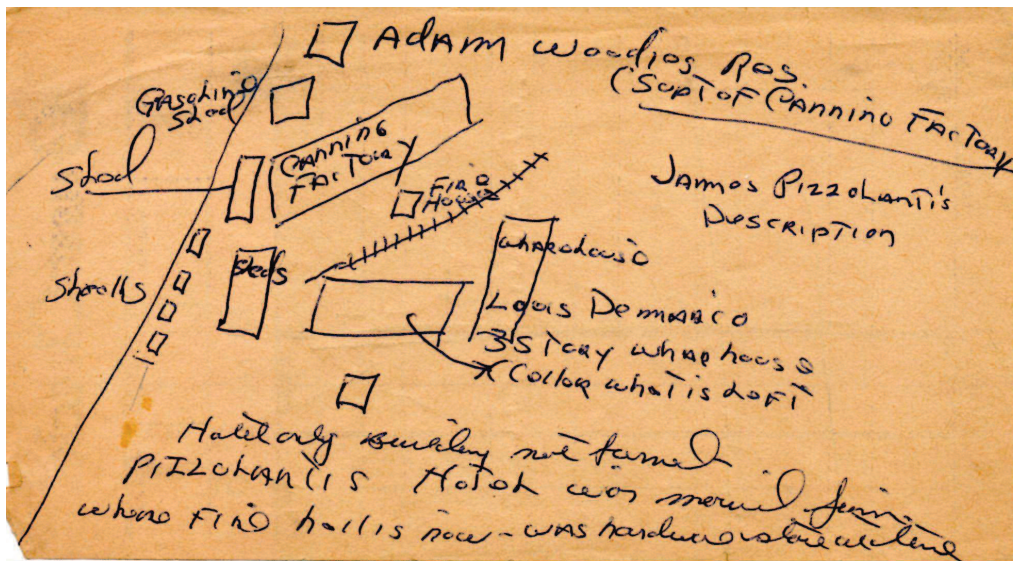


## Can you top this?

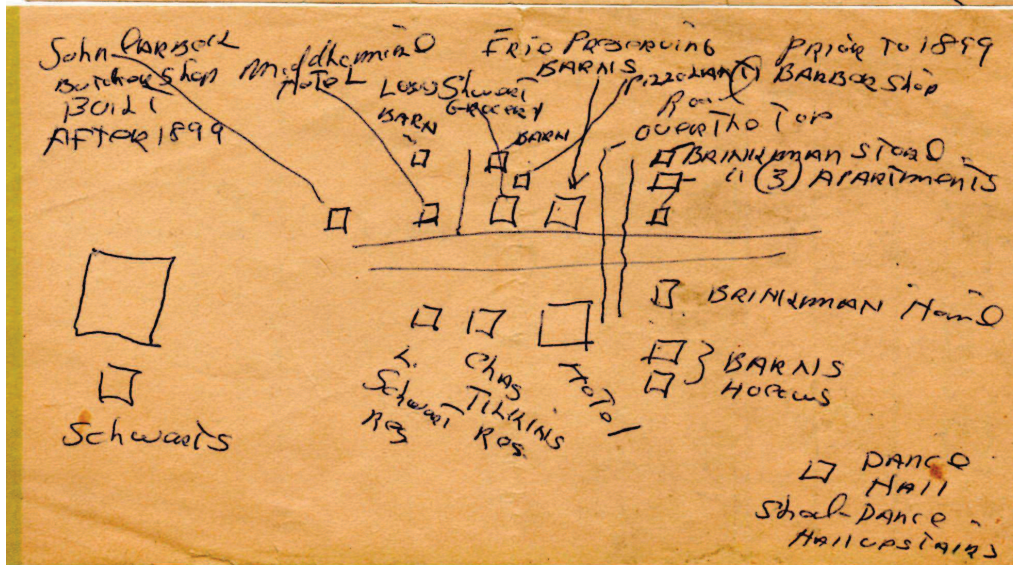
Eighteen years later, in 1908 Edward Falk and Lora Waters were married, therefore setting up the fact that both of my parents were rocked in the same cradle.

MOCCASIN PATHS written by Arthur & Pat Wakolee


Arthur Wakolee a Sauk & Fox Indian lived in Cattarugus County but was originally from woodland tribes that years ago had homes in the central part of the country by Mississippi River. As whites settled they had to move many times. Now are in Iowa and Oklahoma. Book is about how lived, beliefs, feelings about life, teachings and law.

Clan system – their form of government, life, laws and know all given to Indian by God. Taught to worship God daily. Gathered together every season at a ceremony to give thanks for change of seasons. Many teachers – each had a specialty to teach. Pray and thanks for all received and what to get in new hunt. Much food and return of men safely. Must have a good heart when asking the Great One. Solemn and prayerful time. Must travel further each hunt season since whites coming. More preparation to food by men before packing for trip back. Moved to another place – soldiers forced – burned village. Food gathered & divided so all got some. Each move – conditions worse, weather, etc. Soldiers came, took their houses, made them pack worldly goods in wagons and soldiers rode their horses and they had to walk to where they were forced to settle. Day moved he became a man – grown – and walked beside his father. Every move made they had to make as their places were being invaded by whites and changed way of living they believe in, but their faith never waived. Book has Indian names they had for God, liquor, man-soldiers-long knife, tobacco, spirit that guides teachers and brings messages from God, and charcoal on face meant leave folks alone and respected

Arthur spent much time with his grandparents. Learned about arrows – be careful and not careless or wasteful and don't lose. Arthur got paint in eyes and lost sight. Parents took him home and saw white doctors. No results. Went back to grandparents and listened to his grandfather's words of wisdom and his heart was warmed and attitude better. His eyes – grandmother went into woods 3 days in succession and asked for direction to find healing for his eyes. She was directed to a bush – made medicine and applied to eyes until one day he could see and as time passed he saw better each day.

White man won and being winner they felt did not need to understand Indian ways. Grandfather said we must keep our laws and ways, be patient with white brothers. He also continuously taught him about life, Good Indian way of life, beliefs = everything said and done was a lesson. Boy learned and listened intently and could recognize what he was, where he was etc. Was taught that God does not want us to forget. Put us here to live as one family on this earth He made for us. When we find truth and love and learn how to use them every day the He will be happy for us to come back and live with Him again. Funerals – invite family. Feed and give gifts of things family will need. If your family doesn't have enough for themselves – still give gifts. Had a prayer for everything and prayed daily = when anything done, asked or, thankful for, before eating.

Pat Stewart Keyes, friend and co-author of Arthur Wakolee was referred to as Pat Wakolee. Pat was adopted by the Sauk & Fox tribe as a daughter and member of the tribe. Change has caused old customs & traditions to be lost. People now don't know which way to go. It took these truths and reminders to make up remember them as God wants and if we listen – choices at crossroads would be easier.

## New School Will Be Built To Take Place Of One Destroyed By Fire

NEW SCHOOL WILL BE BUILT IN FARNHAM TO TAKE PLACE OF ONE DESTROYED BY FIRE

The school board of Farnham has already taken steps toward building a new school to replace the one destroyed by fire early Monday morning, Jan. 14.

The cost of the new school which will be of brick construction, will be in the neighborhood of \$200,000, and will have class rooms for 8 grades. It will be of modern design.

To date, only preliminary plans have been made, but something of a concrete nature is expected to develop soon. The board will also try to get more grounds for the children.

The fire which destroyed the school was a disastrous one, and had made rapid headway, before the call was put in to the Farnham Fire Dept. Three or four people put in the alarm at the same time.

Both Angola and Silver Creek Fire Departments were called, and they responded quickly.

Near zero temperature and a strong northerly wind made it exceptionally difficult to fight the blaze, which seemed to have started in the rear of the gymnasium. Smoke and sparks were carried to other parts of the village, and set fire to the neighboring St. Anthony's Church steeple. Two streams of water were played on this, but it was over an hour, before the steeple blaze was under control. It was necessary to put a ladder up the side of the church in order to get the water over the

top of the steeple. Both Farnham and Silver Creek firemen had hose on this. Two or three firemen suffered minor injuries—a Silver Creek fireman was taken to the hospital.

The blaze was a spectacular one, being visible as far away as Dunkirk.

These pupils of the eighth grade had nearly \$50 saved for their annual summer outing, and although it was in the safe the terrific heat destroyed it. About 30 to 40 tons of coal were also destroyed. The coal was still burning a week after.

The school was built about 65 years ago and was a landmark in the neighborhood. It was well known by travelers along the Erie Road.

The pupils are now being accommodated in the Farnham Fire Hall and the parish hall of Lutheran Church. The damage to the school was estimated at \$100,000, and to the church steeple at \$1,000.

The Village of Farnham is grateful for the quick response of the Angola firemen and the Silver Creek firemen.

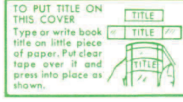
### Ground Broken for Farnham School

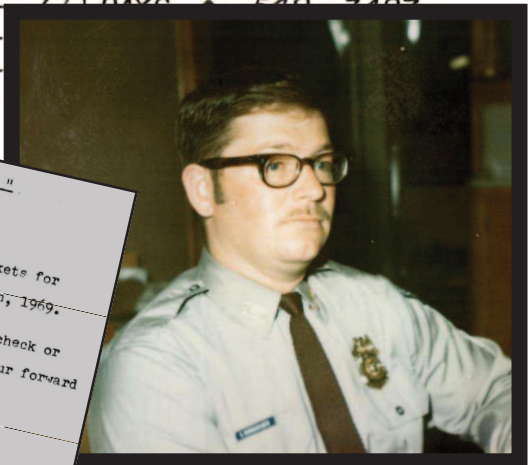
