Brant Will Be Debt Clear

Final Payment of \$500 Will Be Made Jan. 1; Spendand-Charge-It Plan Is Forgotten.

Eric county towns have made a remarkable record in conserving their funds during the depression and subsequent years. Some of them were able to stay out of debt; most of them continued to operate,

for all needs, on a pay-as-you-go basis without resorting to borrowing.

Some of them refused grants of so-called "easy" money from Wash-

Growing up during the "Crash of 1929" and the Great Depression that Followed

My great grandparents came to this country in 1857 from Germany. At the time my grandfather was four years old. They settled in the Town of Brant. When my grandfather was old enough, he married and purchased property to build a home and start a farm. This property is presently owned by Joseph and Helen Catalano.

My grandfather August and wife Maria had two children; Edward and Elizabeth. My father Edward and wife Lora had four children Ernest, Augustos, Edward Jr. and me (Sherman).

I was born in 1925 so I was four at the time of the 1929 crash. After the crash money became almost non-existent, so to get the provisions necessary to put food on the table mother would take a big basket of eggs, about twenty dozen, and butter she made from our cows to a store in North Collins (George Browns) and barter for flour, sugar and spices. Most everything else was supplied by our farm. By the way, this situation was not unique to just our family. It was the norm for most families at the time. The recovery of the crash was very slow and really didn't end until World War II.

A friend of mine, Thomas Dimmick lived on Hardpan Road. There were six children in the family and they were very poor. To receive their welfare food ration once a month the complete family walked to North Collins. The youngest child at the time was six.

SHARE, began when a group of people from three Town of Brant Churches wanted to do something to help the people in Joplin, Missouri, after a tornado ripped thru their city.

In 2011, money was raised through raffles and donations and \$1,000 was donated to *Americares*. *Americares* works with large drug companies and sends needed drugs into disaster areas.

It was important to us that as much of the money we raised went to those who needed it and not to administrative costs. *Americares* administrative costs were 4%.

In 2012, the Eden Quilt Guild held a Quilt Show. After the show, a quilt that had hung in the show was given to raffle as a fund raiser. We decided on the Salvation Army.

Through the quilt raffle and other fund raising activities we were able to donate \$1,540.00 to the Salvation Army Disaster Relief and \$320.00 to the Salvation Army for Disaster Relief for the Town of Brant.

In 2013, for the third year SHARE had a table at Brant Fest. It was decided that any monies raised from our basket raffle would go to the Falk family for their recent barn fire. Our raffle of an Amish rocker raised \$860.00 for the Salvation Army. Remaining monies are being held until we can find out what we can do to help the Tri-Parish Church that burned in Brockton, NY.

Attention Taxpayers!

ADVOCATES of government ownership of the railroads would do well to pause in their enthusiasm long enough to recall the true relationship of government business activity to the burden of taxes. It is of vital concern to every taxpayer.

Noone has pictured the situation more clearly and concisely than Edward E. Loomis in "*The Forum*". He says that private business is a taxpayer and that government business venture is a tax consumer.

"When government enters business in competition with its taxpaying citizens," Mr. Loomis adds, "it destroys its most important tax source. As government encroaches upon private business, it demands more and more from taxpaying groups which, when not actually taxed out of existence, become weaker and weaker in ability to pay."

"For instance, under normal business conditions, the enormous sums paid by the railroads in taxes are available for the support of the various government functions. (about 45 per cent of all rail taxes goes to the support of the public schools.) In the event of government ownership of railroads, who will replace the carriers with this contribution in the common tax pot? The answer is simplethis enormous amount will be spread over the remaining tax payers. "

CORRECTION TO THE December 2013 issue: Holy Cross Lutheran Church ~ 150 YEARS

Holy Cross Lutheran Church is located on Church Street in Farnham, NY and will be celebrating its 150th Anniversary on 09/07/2014. There will be a church service at 10:30 AM and will follow with a dinner at the Colony House.

In 1861 Pastor Grabau of Old Trinity Lutheran Church of Buffalo started to organize the German speaking Protestants for worship in Farnham. Services were held for the next three years in a little school house, but all records began and all anniversaries since are held at 1864 being the real beginning. Services were held in German until 02/01/1916 when English replaced the German.

At Midnight 08/18/1930, a fire completely destroyed the building. They were able to save the altar, pews, statue of lesus and few other articles. Site was cleared and construction of new church was started immediately. On 12/11/1930 the bell was rung for the first time at the Christmas Eve service and is still ringing today.

Two Pastors have come from this church, Pastor Henry C. Wasmund and Pastor Gary Koch. Many pastors have served here over the past 150 years. For approximately a ten year period between 2002 and 2010 we didn't have a pastor, we worked in the capacity of a teaching church. We had a number of vicars who learned from us and we learned from them. We also had supply pastors during this period.

One of our pastors, Reverend Donald Anderson (1969-1975) was instrumental in starting Community Concern right here at Holy Cross. He started it with the prayer and hope that it would succeed, and just look around and see what it has

grown into today and how it serves the people in our area. He also had vicars in training during his six year stay. I still keep in touch with one of the former vicars and his family.

Holy Cross is also proud to claim the Holmes family as one of our long time church family members. Audrey Holmes was an English opera singer who married her husband Ed, one of our GI's, in England during WWII. They came to U.S. after the war and settled in Farnham and lived her for many years. Mrs. Holmes taught music to many fortunate students. Their children, Clint and Gayle, grew up and found a life and fame in the entertainment world. Clint still comes back to his roots to participate in the Variety Club Telethon.

We are blessed to have Reverend Laurie Carson as our spiritual leader and our children will back that up with a big "YES". We have a wonderful Sunday School that starts at 9AM Sept - May. The children are also active in our regular Sunday church services. Our church service from September – May is at 10:30AM. June thru August we start at 9:30AM. Our doors are always open and we hope some of you will pay us a visit.

This is just my personal note: When I was writing this article I learned that my mother was confirmed on 04/16/1916 by Pastor Walter Rhode and it was the first class to be taught in English. 1915 ended the teaching in German. My son Roy was confirmed in the 100th celebration and my great-granddaughter Madison Justinger will be confirmed in the $150^{\rm th}$ Celebration year.
